

What do Chemical Plant Operators do?

Chemical plant operators control or operate entire chemical processes or systems of machines. They may work in factories that produce paint, pesticides, refined oil, synthetic plastics, explosives, or other types of industrial chemical products. Their goal is to ensure that the production process runs safely and smoothly and that the plant produces quality results. They coordinate their efforts with technical and supervisory workers to get all plant workers on the same page. Chemical plant operators primarily monitor the equipment under their charge. They both control instruments and make sure they're working properly. They might also schedule and coordinate maintenance efforts if necessary.

You will have plenty of employment opportunities as a chemical plant operator, but first you will have to complete specific training and earn a certificate or associate degree. By completing courses in chemistry, engineering, math, and science, you will learn the skills necessary to get a job as a chemical plant operator.

- ➤ Inspect operating units, such as towers, soap-spray storage tanks, scrubbers, collectors, or driers to ensure that all are functioning and to maintain maximum efficiency
