

What do Electricians do?

Electricians in the transportation, distribution, and logistics industry install, adjust, or maintain mobile electronics communication equipment, including sound, sonar, security, navigation, and surveillance systems on trains, mass transit, watercraft, or other mobile equipment. They may work on substations and switching stations. They are expected to closely follow manufacturer and company standards. Electricians read blueprints and technical drawings that show the locations of circuits, outlets, load centers, panel boards, and other equipment. They must be trained in many technical areas to be able to install and connect the wires to circuit breakers, transformers, outlets, or other components and systems. They may work outdoors in all types of weather, have to climb to excessive heights, and carry heavy equipment.

Training & Educational Opportunities

You will have many opportunities as an electrician once you've completed a certification program, associate degree, and apprenticeship program. Licensing as an electrician will also be required. At the end of the four to five years of training, apprentices can choose to earn the journey worker designation.

As a Electrician you will:

- Advise management on whether continued operation of equipment could be hazardous
- > Assemble, install, test, or maintain electrical or electronic wiring, equipment, appliances, apparatus, or fixtures, using hand tools or power tools
- > Connect wires to circuit breakers, transformers, or other components

- Construct or fabricate parts, using hand tools, according to specifications
- Diagnose malfunctioning systems, apparatus, or components, using test equipment and hand tools to locate the cause of a breakdown and correct the problem
